CHICAGO, May 7 .- The Socialist National Convention closed its work last night. It was, without doubt, the greatest Socialist convention ever held in the United States. Every state was represented by a full delegation, and many alternates were also there. It marks an epoch in American politics.

Eugene V. Debs, of Indiana, and Bejamin Hanford, of New York, were nominated for president and vice-president. No fitter candidates could have been selected to stand for the working class of the ration. Both are members of Organized Labor and powerful platform speakers, and actual workingmen.

The platform is a clean cut declaration of the Socialist philosophy and will appeal to the working class wherever they read it. Yesterday morning, Comrade Debs delivered a masterly address, accepting the nomination, sounding the alogan for the campaign. Comrade Hanford's speech of acceptance put so much fire in the convention that the daily papers say it raised the roof.

Gentlemen:

Your letter of March 31 has remained unanswered until now in order that I might have my letter files and letter books examined to ascertain whether or not I had ever written any such letter as you mention. 




