October 20th the Sheridan Coal company filed its petition for removal to the federal court at Fort Scott on the grounds that the amount is a non-resident of Kansas and the plaintiff Frank Lane a resident.

At the same time the secretary of the pavy announces arrogantly that hereafter he is not going to observe the eight-hour law in the construction of battleships and Taft, not to be outdone by his
