These signs and many more of capitalist prosperity are observable on every hand. The Taft managers have shrewdly waited until Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Wilson exploded their campaign powder, and they will now get down to earth and talk dollars and cents and jobs to the working people of this country. They will talk to them through the columns of the widely circulated and widely read general and literary publications, because they find it more economical and more effective. This will not submit their spellbinders to the embarrassing questions that confound Roosevelt and Wilson wherever they make their appearance. The silent argument of the printed word is irresistible and makes a deep impression upon the mind.

These stories of prosperity that the Taft advertisments re-

late are true as far as they go. Listen to the Taft managers: 'Let us look this question of the high cost of living fairly in the face. . . . The population of the whole world is rapidly increasing and this increase is much greater in the cities and towns than in the country. There are fewer people producing food, clothing and other necessities of life. And more and more people who are consuming them. THERE IS NO MORE FREE, RICH LANDS TO BE GIVEN AWAY TO NEW FARMERS AND SETTLERS. . . . In short, population is increasing faster than production."

There you have a picture of capitalism after fifty years of

uninterrupted political power by the republican-democratic parties. These fine fellows are now face to face with the real problem of feeding the nation. To show the hopelessness and helplessness of the capitalist politician in this crisis we have only to
read just a bit further along in this statement of "The Plain"

Truth About the High Cost of Living.":

"And this is so all over the world. In England the price"

of meats of all kind, butter, eggs, fuel, clothing and furniture has advanced one-fifth during the past five years. And note that all these articles are duty free. In Germany, almost every article of food, clothing and shelter is very much higher in price than it was five years ago. Many workmen cat no meat, but live on black bread, soup and potatoes. In France beef is 22 per cent higher, fish 50 per cent higher, dry vegetables 30 per cent, coal 34 per cent, milk almost 50 per cent. In Italy, generally believed to be the home of cheap living, eggs cost double what they did five years ago. Beef is 25 per cent higher, milk one-third higher. Other countries show similar conditions of high prices.



The men are not shift-less or criminal by nature. They had been lured by the tales of land speculators to invest in the dry farming territory of the west, and had endured unimagined hardships, while the women and children worked valiantly by their

These farmers have no union organization to back them in their fight for justice; they have no relief funds from which their families may draw support while they are lighting in the courts; the business men who had profited by their trade would no longer credit them, and even the church, though offering forgiveness for sins, could not supply bread that would bring color to the cheeks of the starving.
