Making the World Safe for Plutocracy

The deportation of nearly two thousand union miners from the city of Bisbee, Arizona, by the officials and guernen of the mining corporations has been justly called an outrage. And it is now generally recognized as such by all thinking members of the working class—an outrage not only against organized labor, but against

humanity.

This cowardly and brutal piece of work is plainly an attempt to make workingme either scale on themselves or be driven from the country—to either take the wages offered by the companies or take the consequences. It will be remembered that these miners were not gathered together from the streets or from any disorderly or riotous assemblies; they were rounded up from their fromes where they were peaceably occupied. They were torn from their families by a mob armed with high power rifles and machine guns. They were hepded together like wild beasts, loaded on to box cars and shipped foodless and without water, to the burning desert lambs of New Mexico.

'More clearly than anything that has happened in decades this act of layeless thuggery shows that the big business interests of the United States feel justified in setting aside the laws of the nation at will. Many law abiding workers have always considered the laws as something sacred. But when they see all the laws of state and nation, as well as the rights guaranteed by the constitution, brushed aside arbitrarily by a private corporation to suit its own purposes, what are they to think?

If this crime is permitted to go unpunished, if it is allowed to stand; if it is nstigators and perpetrators are not reprehended and sentenced the same as other law breakers, the consequences are likely to reach stupendous proportions. If it remains on record as a precedent, and the tendency of private corporation to take the law into their own hands whenever they see fit is not checked, the result will ultimately lead to an industrial reign of terror. The work while on the job was hard and dangerous and we were speeded up to the maximum of our endurance and strength. For this expenditure of our strength and energy, we received the lowest wage the companies could beat us down to, a bare subsistence, after paying for our board, very little money was left to buy clothing, etc. This board that we received was the cheapest variety and at times it was putrid, a dog would not eat it. The kitchen was unsanitary and dirty and resembled a blacksmith shop more than a kitchen. Our sleeping uparters was the home, or rather paradise, of the bedding and other vermin. We were packed like sardines in a can, poor ventilation and the odor of drying socks, etc., made refreshing sleep impossible.

These unsanitary bunkhouses were the breeding places of

impossible.

These unsanitary bunkhouses were the breeding places of numerous germs and disease and were responsible for the smallpox and other epidemics. Another grievance of the workers was the charging of the hospital fee. The medical treatment you got when sick was a farce; in some-instances the men paid their fee three or foor times a month.
