What is to be done with the I. W. W.? This is the question everybody is asking. An advance over the obliteration of the "damnable doctrine" of One Big Union. The newspaper whores of the kept press are trying to outdo each other in suggesting ways and means of putting the kibosh on Labor's most effective form of organization. Having tasted of the blood of Frank Little, they are now screaming for more, tempering their blood-howl judicationsly with the vapid stock phrases of "military necessity" and "patriotism"—any old thing just so all organized opposition to the greed of the insatiable ghouls of Big Business is removed, and removed for good. Hanging, deportation, exile, lynching and imprisonment are a few of the kind suggestions offered as a means to this end.

As the "war" situation becomes more tense the excuses for doing away with the L.W. W. become manifold. With the country undistribed due to the war their venorious campaign for the annihilation of the country and the organization is too far-fetched and obvious in purpose to be really effective. And so the whole dade-hearted crew of indo-trial pirates is waiting for the first American blood-letting in Befrope so that the aparthetic accisor-folis can be lashed to a war fernay in a burry. The country as a whole is not only indifferent to but hostile to the war. Every effort to produce a real enthusiasmo for the spreading of America's spurious "democracy" has resulted in rank failure. The exemption claim of the nation's workers is the thermometer of the war sentiment. This silent vote against working class participation in Wall Street's international tangles has filled the war lords with constrenation and impotent rage.

The truth is that the fighting institucts of American workers are innsing full expression in the industrial war at home. The barbarities of war-swept Europe are forgotten in barbarities of the since of the finedish overlords of industry within our own borders. The dietartorship and despoising of the Kaiser is overshadowed by the arbitrary despoising of the loud-mounthed aposities of "democracy" in America. And so the Powers that be are waiting for the beginning of the blood

with which they waited for the "overt act."

When the first troop ships are sent to the bottom and the first regiments are blown to atoms, then the profit-greedy cowards of the plunderbund will have their hirelings of the press open up with editorial broadsides against organized labor all over the country. The membership of the I. W. W. is conscious of its power and knows how to achieve its ends, and is dead game to take whatever measures are necessary in order to so. Prison walls are but an oasis in the hateful desert of Capitalism, and death itself has become a "sweet, peaceful, welcome" release from the ghastly nightmare that Exploitation and Oppression have made of our lives. And you smug and comfortable gentlemen who are deciding what is to be done with the I. W. W., think these things over well before you place yourselves in history as the myopic imbedies of Capitalism' who tried to stop irresistible Growth and to repress the irrepressible.

If you see fit to attempt to crush the I. W., W., to jail or execute its officials and to silence its press you should know a little something of the caliber of the men and women with whom you are about to cross swords. We do not court marryrdom nor are weafraid of it. We are out to "get the goods." And the membership of the L W.
